Introduction

In Hungary a law came in power by which books, films or advertisements that show gay, lesbian or transgender people are prohibited.

The matter

The Dutch Prime Minister reacts oral with a destructive judgment on the law and a ruthless contempt of people who think and express differently from this Prime Minister's opinion and expression. This emotion shows the real moral to combat the Human Rights, which are precisely about being not obliged to think or express the same. The Human Rights precisely do not turn over the roles.

The included: a fake judicial system, tribunals or judges

Evidently exposed and expresses the Dutch Prime Minister the Dutch government's testimony of the fake of the judicial system and the "Rule of Law" in Contracting States and in Europe. Gay, lesbians and everyone can lodge a claim at a national court for a fair trial, when each individual's right is infringed. Also in Hungary, as in any country. When the national tribunal or judge and judicial system fails then a claim is lodged at the European Court for Human Rights. This is outside national influence or power. The rebellion reaction of the Dutch Prime Minister is caused by the convincing knowledge that the European Court is only for the show and for a fake seriousness. It is a highlighted signal that the public scrutiny and the judicial system, tribunal or judge, is not mentioned at all.

Convincing knowledge

This occasion is the third one after the insertions in the migration treaty and "Ukraine treaty", after the Dutch allowance affair ("Toeslagenaffaire") en now this Hungarian lhtb affair. So any doubt about awareness of the criminalities of the courts, tribunals or judges is smashed to pieces

Abandon of the individual civilians

Despite the convincing knowledge, the people above the latent discrimination line do nothing done about the criminals who are active in courts as judges or at courts in the administration of justice. Rutte: Hongaarse anti-homowet is verschrikkelijk en onacceptabel

Demissionair premier Rutte noemt de Hongaarse wet die volgens de Hongaarse premier Orbán "een verbod op homo-promotie" regelt "echt onacceptabel".

Door de nieuwe wet zijn boeken en films met een homoseksueel personage of reclames waarin homo's of transgenders worden getoond vanaf nu verboden. De Hongaarse regering zegt jongeren "te willen beschermen tegen informatie over homoseksualiteit en geslachtsverandering".

"Verschrikkelijk", noemt Rutte dit. "Als Europa, naast een markt- en munteenheid ook een waarde-gemeenschap is, en dat vinden we allemaal, dan kan het niet waar zijn dat in de Europese Unie een land zoiets achterlijks uithaalt als de Hongaren nu doen".

Daar zal aanstaande donderdag in de Europese Raad over gesproken worden, zegt Rutte, die erop wijst dat de Europese Commissie al een procedure tegen Hongarije is gestart.

De EU liet al weten naar mogelijkheden te kijken om sancties op te leggen aan Hongarije. Volgens EU-commissaris Helena Dalli worden de waarden van de Europese Unie met de nieuwe wet geschonden.

Rutte: Hungarian anti-gay law is terrible and unacceptable

Outgoing Prime Minister Rutte calls the Hungarian law that regulates according to Hungarian Prime Minister Orbán "a ban on gay promotion" "really unacceptable".

Due to the new law, books and films with a gay character or commercials showing gay or transgender people are now prohibited. The Hungarian government says it wants to protect young people "from information about homosexuality and gender reassignment".

"Terrible", Rutte calls this. "If, in addition to being a market and currency unit, Europe is also a community of values, and we all agree, then it cannot be true that a country in the European Union is doing something so backward as the Hungarians are doing now."

This will be discussed in the European Council next Thursday, says Rutte, who points out that the European Commission has already started proceedings against Hungary.

The EU has already said it is looking at options to impose sanctions on Hungary. According to EU Commissioner Helena Dalli, the new law violates the values of the European Union.

Rainbow protest at European Championship match

Munich city council wants to illuminate the Allianz Arena where Hungary and Germany meet on Wednesday in rainbow colors.

The city council wants mayor Dieter Reiter to lobby UEFA to get the proposal through. It is a "visible expression of solidarity" towards the Hungarian LGBTI community, which suffers from "homophobic and transphobic legislation", according to the council.
